

## I'm Overwhelmed!



Did you know that many people, maybe just like you, are hesitant to learn to use a computer and the Internet? In this lesson, we'll look at a few reasons why some people feel this way, and help you to think through your own reasons for learning.

Is it worth it to try?






Listing the pros and cons of using a computer can help us to think things through

## "It's too hard! It's too complicated!"

Get the facts: Learning something new like using a computer can seem overwhelming at first. But if we go step by step, and learn one skill at a time, we can build skills quickly. Research shows that as we learn a new skill, the skill gets easier and easier to do. Basic tasks become automatic, and it becomes easier to build on our knowledge.





## "I'm too old to start now."

Some older adults lack interest in learning new things. They want to focus on things that matter more, and the things they enjoy doing. But using a computer can help them stay in touch with family and friends, and can also help with exercising the brain. Nearly 60% of seniors use the Internet, and that percentage is increasing every year.






"Getting online just isn't safe!"

Concern about safety is a common reason people don't want to use a computer and the Internet. We hear stories about people being scammed and harmed online. There are risks involved, but you can stay safe by learning. By taking classes at the library or online, and by asking questions of library staff and others who know more, you can learn to stay safe. Millions of people do it every day!






Now that we've talked about common concerns, I'd like to ask you: How important is it to you to learn to use a computer?

Click one of the buttons to select the number, then click on Submit.






The screen now shows your score.

What is it, for you, that's making it at least a little bit important?






## Let's try one more scale.

On a scale of one to 10, how confident are you that you can learn to use a computer and the Internet?

On this scale, 1 means not at all confident, and 10 means extremely confident.

Click one of the buttons to record the number, then click on Submit.





I've asked you to consider and write down your own thoughts and feelings throughout this lesson. You've made it this far, which shows your commitment to learning more. As we wrap up, I'd like you to do one final thing, which is to set a goal.





Here's an example. It's helpful to choose something you can do in the next couple of weeks that will move you toward increasing confidence and learning more about using a computer. It's important to pick something small, and to include when you'll do it. Think about your own goals, and write down two small things you can work on in the next few weeks.
